- 1. Management of rumors and misinformation about COVID19 vaccine and vaccination
 - Weekly analysis of community feedback
 - Training in rumor management and infodemics by the WHO consultant
 - Creation of a Rumor Log
- Involvement of religious and community leaders and elected officials (deputies and senators)
 - Involvement of civil society, NGOs and professional corporations in support of COVID-19 vaccination
- 3. Production of audio-visual materials: posters, radio spots, banners, billboards
 - Involvement of community radios and online media
 - Recruitment of a digital platform for info-veillance

CHALLENGES (English translation)

- 1. Delayed acceptance of the vaccine by country leaders, at almost 5 months after the official launch of the campaign in April 2021
 - Delayed infodemic response
 - Poor implementation of local communications strategies and social mobilization
- Update and popularize the communication plan
 Strong public mistrust of COVID-19 vaccines du
 - Strong public mistrust of COVID-19 vaccines due to weak commitment from the authorities
 - Promotion of the EPI website and social media
 - Establishment of social listening
- 3. Production of recordings/2-minute video clips on vaccination against COVID-19 to counteract rumors or disinformation
 - Weak engagement of state media in raising awareness for COVID-19 vaccination

ACTION PLAN

Activities

Organize an advocacy meeting to sensitize the sharing of dates and target

groups in advance

Draw up a SOP for communication during campaign

Hold community meetings with leaders to raise awareness

Dissemination of messages through mobile brigades with ICS support





Activities

B. Mid and long term implemenation

Ensure the introduction of new target groups at the end of each planned

phase

Organize meetings to present the vaccination plan to CBOs at all levels.

Organize training and planning meetings

Carry out actions to monitor the progress of each CBO

DESCRIPTION OF THE MINI-CPIE

- 1. Review period: January 2020- September 2021
- 2. Date of review: 05/OCT/2021 08/OCT/2021
- 3. Geographical scope: National / Sub-national
- Number and profile of participants: Approximately 60 participants from key stakeholder institutions (60 participants + 13 observers/external facilitators = 73 total)

5. Programme areas reviewed:

- Country-level coordination, planning and monitoring & national legislation and financing;
- Risk communication, community engagement, and infodemic management;
- Surveillance, case investigation and contact tracing;

- The national laboratory system;
- Infection prevention and control;
- Case management and knowledge sharing about innovation and the latest research;
- Public health and social measures.



GOOD PRACTICES

- 1. "Inter-institutional Communication Coordination Group" ensured information, campaign and messaging coordination
- 2. Evidence-based targeted communication building on findings from 5 waves of Behavioral Insights studies and adoption of a COVID-19 national communication strategy
- 3. Dedicated official webpage and extensive use of mass and social media channels

CHALLENGES

- 1. Shortage and lack of trained RCCE specialists at both national and local level institutions
- 2. Fragmented research activities with no mechanism in place to coordinate all relevant research studies and lack of updated RCCE Vaccination Plan and SOPs
- 3. Increased workload for appointed RCCE experts to handle media inquiries and pandemic burnout/fatigue



GOOD PRACTICES

- 4. Reaching-out to all target population groups, including hard-to-reach and vulnerable communities
- 5. Establishment of 5 types of 24-hrs toll-free helplines, including psychosocial support

6. Recent establishment of "Communication Hub" to assist MoH with partners support

CHALLENGES

- 4. No systematic mapping of community structures/leaders/influencers/CSOs to reach vulnerable populations & community engagement
- 5. Targeting challenged by daily newspapers going out of print and lack of an Internet domain top-level name
- 6. Lack of a permanent system and capacities in place to detect, assess, evaluate and respond to misinformation/disinformation and infodemic management

Actions & impact on COVID-19 vaccine uptake

Key Recommendations – RCCE Response

Short-term recommendations

- Establishment of a "RCCE Working Group" with agreed ToRs to include relevant stakehodlers
- Conduct situation analysis and needs assessment for RCCE capacity building, identification / mapping of community structures / leaders / infuencers / CSOs
- Update of existing national RCCE plan
- Engage with new "Communication Hub" to strengthen media services, RCCE capacity-building and IDM efforts

Mid to long-term recommendations

- Develop training package targeting: PH professionals, RCCE specialists and media health reporters
- Identification and development of digital solutions to improve internal/external knowledge/information management amongst RCCE stakeholders (RCCE/research activities and document management)
- Roll-out of training packages (ToT cascaded) curriculum development and application to medical chambers for accreditation



COVID-19 trainings for Health Workers (HWs)

Communicating with patients



- Strategies to assist HWs with communication during vaccination consultations.
- Tailored to patient positions on vaccination.
- Combines theory + practical skill building scenarios.
- COVID-19 vaccine/vaccination resources for HWs to support vaccination consultations.
- Audience: Frontline HWs (vaccinators).
- Facilitated via Zoom direct to HWs or ToTs.

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Communicating with patients about COVID-19 vaccination - training package

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Training module

The training module, in the form of presentation slides, provides a structured approach to assist health workers with interpersonal communication during COVID-19 vaccination consultations and is tailcred to specific patient positions on vaccination. Participants are guided through 6 learning parts focusing on a combination of theory and practical skill building scenarios. Relevant COVID-19 vaccine and vaccination resources for health workers are provided to support vaccination consultations. This training is primarily for frontline health workers who will be vaccinators.

Facilitator's guide

The Facilitator's guide is designed to accompany the training module, providing detailed explanations and resources for all parts of the training module. A pre and post training self-reflection survey and post-training evaluation tool is also included. The facilitator's guide is intended for training facilitators or Trainers of Trainers (ToTs) who will be conducting the training at the country level.

Job aid

The job aid is an interpersonal communication tool designed to support health workers in facilitating structured and collaborative COVID-19 vaccination conversations with patients, aiming to increase vaccine confidence and acceptance. It is intended for use in vaccination consultation settings.

In a few words, what risk communication and community engagement strategies have you seen that worked well to increase COVID-19 vaccine uptake?

- Increase the understanding of Risk and benefit of with and without COVID-19 vaccination during the pandemic ; peer a family engagement approach
- Communicating with population and try to explain the importance of the issue..asking them why they have not been vaccinated till now and ask them for their propositions..they feel active
- Even after vaccinated peoples got covid19 positive
- Coordination across sub-pillars such as the logistics to ensure communication happens ahead of supplies
- Working with community leader in providing clear, benefit and possible adverse effects. Explain clearly of the more benefit of vaccination than not vaccination.
- Active listening, Explain and address misinformation. Help to understand protection benefits of vaccination.
- Coordinate and partner with people fr the same community to help explain the correct information and its benefits correct misconceptions brought about by rumors and misinformation.
- Giving the right information against misinformation and rumors
- Listening and responding honestly to the concerns of individuals and communities
- Religious beliefs and evolving religious leaders to minimize misinformation
- Infodémie et communication à travers les relais communautaire
- Collaboration with religious teams and leaders to create awareness and avail spaces for outreach services

- Dynamic follow up of rumors with constant communication with communities to respond to the questions they have on the COVID-19 vaccines. Engagement of high level political, religious and traditional leaders.
- Involvment of religious and community leaders
- Interpersonal communication, engagement with civil society organizations, use of social media and use of health worker professional associations.
- NOTHING
- Neighbourhood meet and greet for direct conversations
- Engagement of local leaders, elites and religious leaders
- Interactive SMS
- Bringing vaccines to communities in hard-to-reach area
- Risk perception and risk/benefic communications
- Undertaking outreach in advance of the arrival of mobile vaccination teams to sensitise and address questions and public concerns.
- Work at comunity level with leader
- Health worker training in IPC
- Social media campaigns
- Training of health workers on their communication strategies
- Direct engagement with CSOs and professional associations who have worked with adults and high risk
